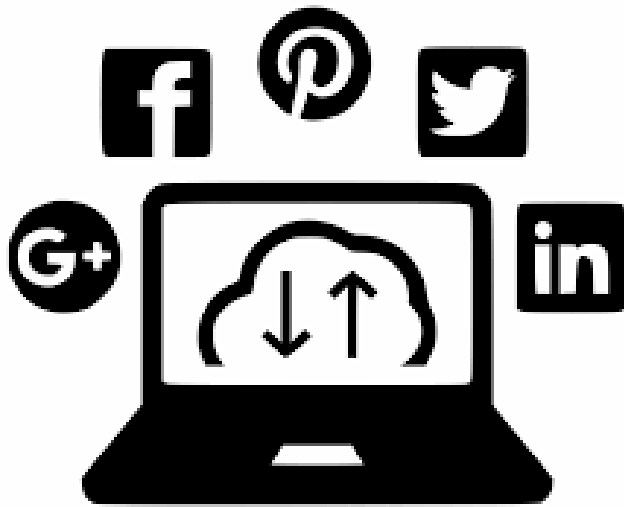
How can the club help the prospective student-athletes?

CAMPUS VISITS



Q. What is the difference between an official visit and an unofficial visit?

- A. A college campus visit that has any part financed by the school is considered an official visit. College coaching staff typically save official visit invitations for their top recruits, and players they believe could deserve a scholarship offer.
- B. Visits paid for by college-bound student-athletes or their parents are unofficial visits.

Q. How many official visits can you take at the NCAA Div. I level?

- A. 5 for NCAA Div. I, one official visit per school.

Can you schedule your visit (s) around your club game / high school playing schedule and your SAT / ACT testing dates thus limiting the conflicts?

SCHEDULE



July / August:

- Report in for pre-season (testing, rules, policies, medical, captain's practice)
- Two weeks of training (multiple times per day)
- 2-3 pre-season exhibition games

Daily Schedule:

- 6:00am – Weight Room / Rehab
- 7:30am - Breakfast
- 8:00am – Attend Classes
- 12:30pm - Lunch
- 1:00pm – Rehab / Prep
- 1:30pm – Team Training Session
- 4:00pm – Athletic Treatments
- 5:30pm – Dinner
- 7:00pm – Study Hall (monitored)
- 10:00pm - Relax

SCHEDULE



Fall Season:

- August – November / December
- 5-6 training sessions per week
- Friday – Sunday travel
- Possible mid-week game
- Permission to miss class / make up exams / projects
- Mid-term – October; Finals – December
- Full-time student (minimum of 12 credit hours)

Spring Season:

- January – May / June
- Holiday work out program / testing
- Full time training / student
- Slightly heavier academic workload
- 5-6 playing dates (NCAA Div. I)
- Decreased travel

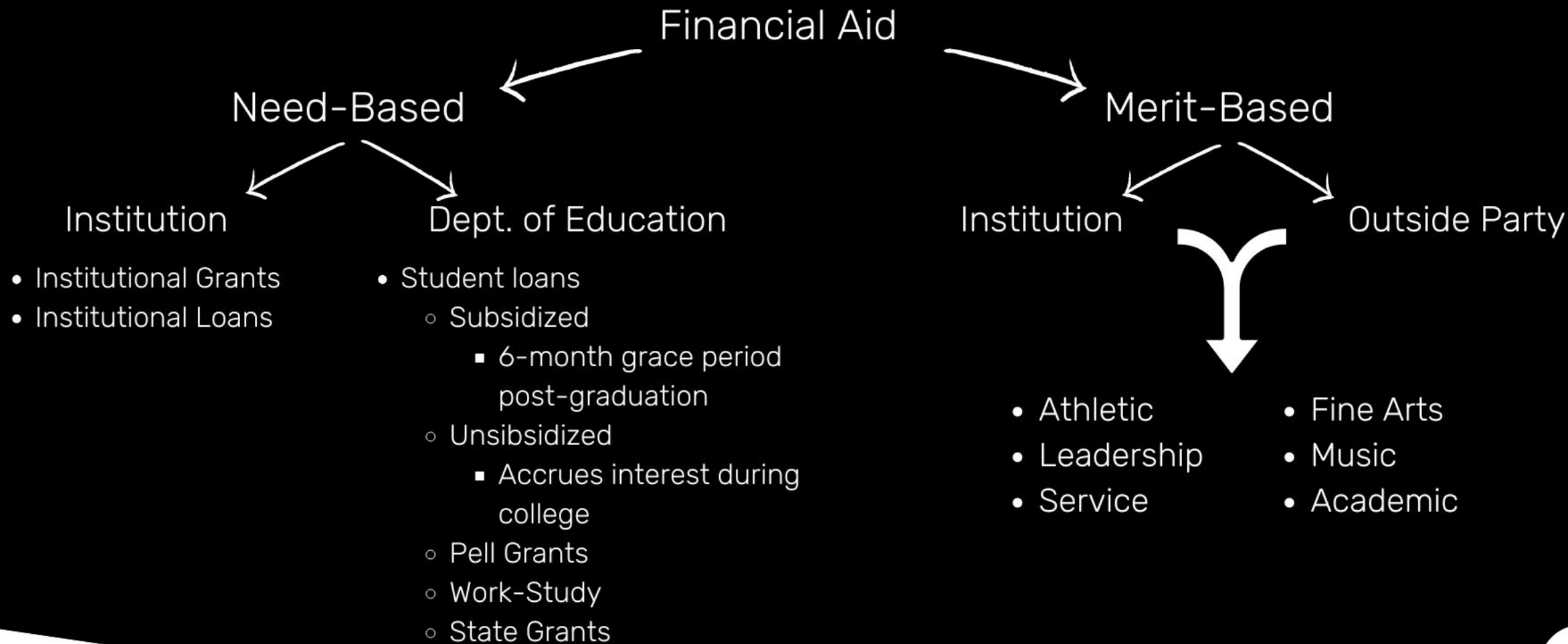


- NCAA Division I Men's Soccer team - 9.9 athletic scholarships per team (old limit), 2025 – NCAA New Scholarship Limits TBA
- NCAA Division 1 Women's Soccer teams - 14 athletic scholarships per team (old limit), 2025 – NCAA New Scholarship Limits TBA
- NCAA Division 2 Women's Soccer teams - 9.9 athletic scholarships per team
- NCAA Division 2 Men's Soccer teams - 9.0 athletic scholarships per team
- NCAA Division 3 Soccer does not provide athletic scholarships, they provide need-based aid, academic aid & grants

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) offers scholarships on both the Division I and Division II level. Division III level sports do not offer scholarship (athletic) funding.

Institutions: Colleges will have their own scholarships displayed on their website. The application for admission is often the application for scholarships, but students might need to complete a separate scholarship application.

WHY IS FINANCIAL AID IMPORTANT?

Realistic Expectations

- Students and parents need to understand the financial realities of their situation
- Admission to a college that is too expensive can be a waste of time and upsetting to students

No College is Worth Full Price

- The single greatest indicator of success for a student is not where they attend, but what they do there. No college, regardless of ranking, guarantees success.
- Students need to consider the long-term ramifications of loans when applying to expensive colleges.

College is Expensive

- College is a significant emotional and financial investment. Any financial aid can reduce the stress and anxiety of the college search process.
- Life outside of the classroom is also expensive. Scholarships and financial aid can free up resources for costs associated with living as a college student.

WHAT IS A CORE COURSE?

For a high school class to be an NCAA-approved core course, it must meet these conditions:

1. Be a four-year college preparatory course in one of these subject areas:

or higher)

2. Be on your school's list of NCAA-approved core courses.
3. Be taught by a qualified instructor at or above your high school's regular academic level.
4. Receive credit toward high school graduation and appear on an official transcript with course title, grade and credit awarded.

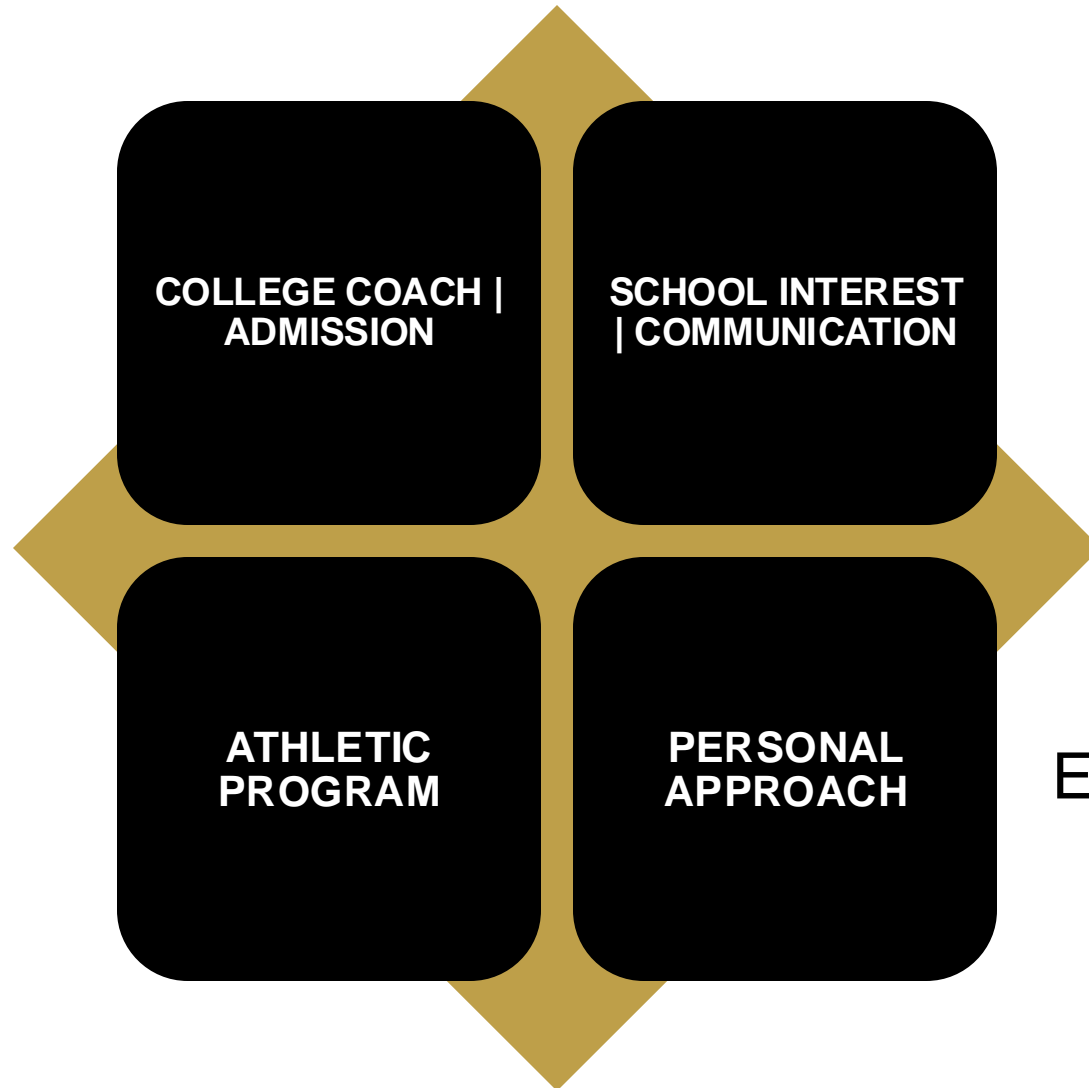

PHONE CONVERSATIONS W/COACH



- ✓ Prepare!
- ✓ Natural flowing conversation
- ✓ 10-15 questions
- ✓ Initial conversation – do not ask about the amount of scholarship
- ✓ Maximize your time, develop a relationship
- ✓ Don't be afraid to ask questions about the program, campus, student body, facilities, academics
- ✓ Ask questions regarding the coach, show that you are interested in him / her
- ✓ Don't be a robot, be yourself, relax, enjoy the dialogue

VIDEO TIPS



- ✓ Video from elevated position
- ✓ Title screen with name, graduation year, team name, position, #, jersey color
- ✓ Short video of 3-4 minutes
- ✓ Each clip start and finish 3-4 seconds prior to the highlighted area
- ✓ Best highlight(s) must be #1
- ✓ Use graphics such as circles to help educate and help the coach upon review
- ✓ Show to your coach for review, gain feedback

PLAYER <> COACH COMMUNICATIONS <> RULES

What are some NCAA DI rules?

- No “communication with a coach” until June 15 of sophomore year
- No Official or Unofficial visits until August 1 of junior year
- No “Recruiting Conversations” or Verbal Offers until June 15 of sophomore year

What is considered “communication with a coach?”

- Includes any phone, text and/or email conversations between a student-athlete or parent/guardian and a DI college coach.
- Previously, coaches were prohibited from initiating contact with a recruit. However, if an athlete called a coach, the coach could pick up the phone. That is no longer allowed. There is zero off-campus communication allowed between a coach and a recruit before June 15 of an athlete’s sophomore year.

- ✓ Create a ‘personal’ professionally written email & attach your link and send to coaching staff
- ✓ Provide league, tournament schedules & invite the coach(s) to attend
- ✓ Review college coaching list in attendance (cross reference / communicate)
- ✓ Review video tutorials and update your video highlights
- ✓ Weekly coach communication

- ✗ Don't brag, be arrogant or obnoxious
- ✗ Don't post controversial topics – race, politics, religion, sexual orientation
- ✗ Inappropriate language
- ✗ Don't engage in illegal activities
- ✗ Bullying
- ✗ Don't post lazy behaviors
- ✗ Don't rely solely on social media for college exposure
- ✗ Angry, emotional responses
- ✗ Don't post something you have to delete
- ✗ Embarrass the club / high school
- ✗ Inappropriate picture, video



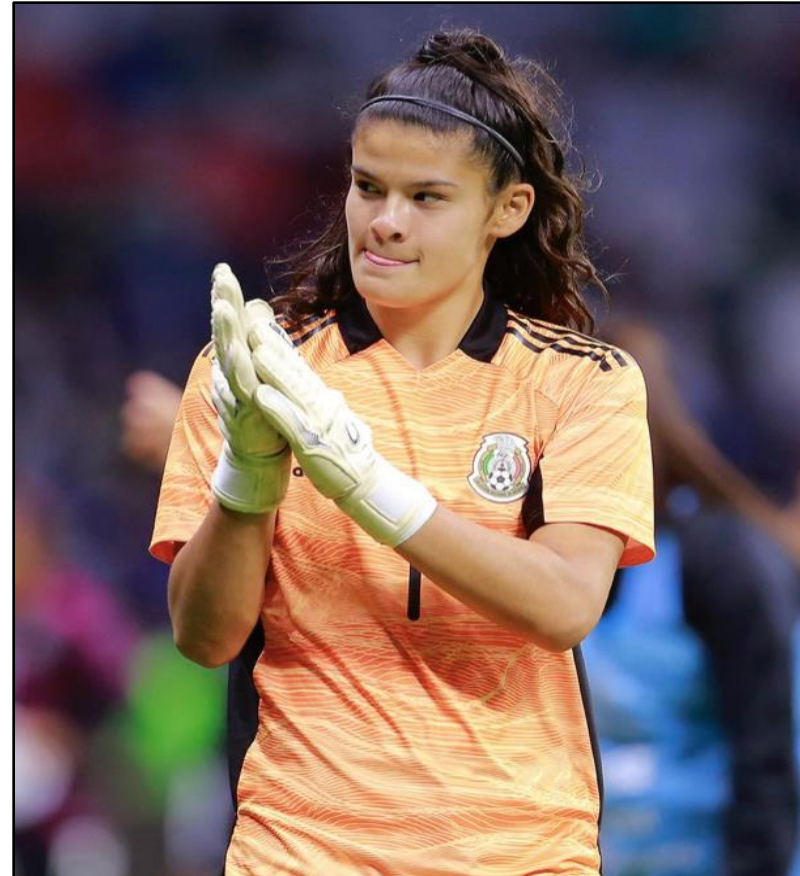
